for Palm Sunday



Today we begin to hear the story of Holy Week, with the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. At times in this service, though, we keep in mind the events that are to follow as the week unfolds.

The Gathering

Welcome & Notices

Before the service, the president offers words of welcome and gives any notices. More about what's going on in and around St Mary's will be found on our website, rossparishes.uk and Facebook page St Mary's Church Ross-on-Wye.

Our service then begins at the west end of the nave.

The Greeting

Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you

All and also with you.

The Introduction

The president introduces the celebration.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ, during Lent we have been preparing by works of love and self-sacrifice for the celebration of our Lord's death and resurrection. Today we come together to begin this solemn celebration in union with the Church throughout the world. Christ enters his own city to complete his work as our Saviour, to suffer, to die, and to rise again. Let us go with him in faith and love, so that, united with him in his sufferings, we may share his risen life.

Blessing of the Palms

We hold up our palm crosses while this prayer is said by the president.

God our Saviour,
whose Son Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem as Messiah to suffer and to die;
let these palms be for us signs of his victory
and grant that we who bear them in his name
may ever hail him as our King,
and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life;
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

Introit Hymn

Prayers of Penitence

The sacrifice acceptable to God is a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart God will not despise. Our sins accuse us.

We confess them to God.

cf Psalm 51.17

We sit to confess our sins.

Lord Jesus Christ, we confess we have failed you as did your first disciples. We ask for your mercy and your help.

When we take our ease rather than watch with you:

Lord, forgive us.

All Christ have mercy.

When we bestow a kiss of peace yet nurse enmity in our hearts: Lord, forgive us.

All Christ have mercy.

When we strike at those who hurt us rather than stretch out our hands to bless: Lord, forgive us.

All Christ have mercy.

When we deny that we know you for fear of the world and its scorn: Lord, forgive us.

All Christ have mercy.

Absolution

Almighty God,
who forgives all who truly repent,
have mercy upon you,
pardon and deliver you from all your sins,
confirm and strengthen you in all goodness,
and keep you in life eternal;
through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Almighty and everlasting God, who in your tender love towards the human race sent your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ to take upon him our flesh

and to suffer death upon the cross:
grant that we may follow the example of his patience and humility,
and also be made partakers of his resurrection;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever.

The Liturgy of the Word

Old Testament Reading

Please sit for the reading

Rejoice greatly, O daughter Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter Jerusalem! Lo, your king comes to you; triumphant and victorious is he, humble and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey. He will cut off the chariot from Ephraim and the warhorse from Jerusalem; and the battle-bow shall be cut off, and he shall command peace to the nations; his dominion shall be from sea to sea, and from the River to the ends of the earth. As for you also, because of the blood of my covenant with you, I will set your prisoners free from the waterless pit. Return to your stronghold, O prisoners of hope; today I declare that I will restore to you double.

The Gradual

We stand to sing the hymn, or sit while the choir sings the psalm (118.1-2,19-29), which introduces the Gospel. Details are on the newsletter. During this hymn the Gospel procession moves to the top of the nave symbolising the coming of God into our world.

The Sermon

The Creed

We stand to join in with the words of the historic Nicene Creed, a summary of our Christian faith.

All We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ,
the only Son of God,
eternally begotten of the Father,
God from God, Light from Light,
true God from true God,
begotten, not made,
of one Being with the Father;
through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven,

was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit,
the Lord, the giver of life,
who proceeds from the Father and the Son,
who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come.
Amen.

Prayers of Intercession

We sit or kneel for the prayers. At the end of each section there is a response that reflects our parish vision:

We offer our prayers to God, in the name of Jesus Christ and in the power of the Holy Spirit.

We pray that all people may recognise Jesus as the one who comes in the name of Lord. God, whose son Jesus Christ subverted the expectations of the crowd, we pray for the Church and for the world:

For those who are intrigued or baffled by Jesus; For those who are challenged or angered by the Gospel; For all who are seeking to follow the way of discipleship. Lord we pray,

All fill us with faith, hope and love.

God, whose son Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem on the first Palm Sunday, we pray for our town and community:

For those who live or work here, in comfort or in need;

For those who come as visitors, that we may welcome them;

For those whose decisions and example shape our common life.

Lord we pray,

All fill us with faith, hope and love.

We pray that the disturbing story of Jesus may continue to find its way into hearts and minds, and so renew lives and transform the World.

God, whose son Jesus Christ humbled himself even to death on the cross, we pray for all in pain or distress:

For those who suffer because of the inhumanity of others;

For those who are sick, or frail, or depressed, we pray especially for ...

For those who have dies and the bereaved, especially ...

Lord we pray,

All fill us with faith, hope and love.

We pray for strength and encouragement, for wholeness and for justice, for comfort and for hope.

God, whose son Jesus Christ is exalted and given the name above every name, we pray for the coming of your kingdom:

In the lives of your people;

In the worship and witness of your Church;

In and for the whole of your Creation.

Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!

All Let it be so! Amen.

The Liturgy of the Sacrament

The Peace

The president introduces the Peace:

Christ is our peace. He offered up his life for us with a love beyond imagining; with a love which dispels fear; with a love which holds and guides us through life's trials and joys.

The peace of the Lord be always with you:

All and also with you.

The Eucharistic Prayer

This long prayer, containing many elements, is the very heart of our Eucharist. In it we all pray that the Real Presence of Christ may be present in form of bread and wine, and that by partaking in this remembrance of Christ we may be spiritually united with God.

We stand for the Eucharist Prayer.

The Lord is here.

All His Spirit is with us.

Lift up your hearts.

All We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

All It is right to give thanks and praise.

It is indeed right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks, holy Father, almighty and eternal God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

For as the time of his passion and resurrection draws near the whole world is called to acknowledge his hidden majesty. The power of the life-giving cross reveals the judgement that has come upon the world and the triumph of Christ crucified.

He is the victim who dies no more, the Lamb once slain, who lives for ever, our advocate in heaven to plead our cause, exalting us there to join with angels and archangels, for ever praising you and singing:

All Holy, holy, holy Lord,
God of power and might,
heaven and earth are full of your glory.
Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Accept our praises, heavenly Father, through your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ,

and as we follow his example and obey his command, grant that by the power of your Holy Spirit these gifts of bread and wine may be to us his body and his blood; who, in the same night that he was betrayed, took bread and gave you thanks; he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

In the same way, after supper
he took the cup and gave you thanks;
he gave it to them, saying:
Drink this, all of you;
this is my blood of the new covenant,
which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it,
in remembrance of me.

Therefore, heavenly Father,
we remember his offering of himself
made once for all upon the cross;
we proclaim his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension;
we look for the coming of your kingdom,
and with this bread and this cup
we make the memorial of Christ your Son our Lord.

Great is the mystery of faith:

All Christ has died,Christ is risen:Christ will come again.

Accept through him, our great high priest, this our sacrifice of thanks and praise, and as we eat and drink these holy gifts in the presence of your divine majesty, renew us by your Spirit, inspire us with your love and unite us in the body of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Through him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

All Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever.

Amen.

The Lord's Prayer

We sit to say the words that Jesus taught us to pray.

Beleiving the promises of God, as our Saviour taught us, so we pray

All Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation

but deliver us from evil.

For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever.

Amen.

Breaking of the Bread

The president breaks the consecrated bread.

We break the bread of life,
And that life is the light of the world.

All God here among us,
light in the midst of us,
bring us to light and life.
