# Prayer & readings for today

#### **Collect**

Heavenly Father, whose blessed Son was revealed to destroy the works of the devil and to make us the children of God and heirs of eternal life: grant that we, having this hope, may purify ourselves even as he is pure; that when he shall appear in power and great glory we may be made like him in his eternal and glorious kingdom; where he is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen

**First Reading** (Reader: A reading from the second letter of Paul to the Thessalonians.) Now we command you, beloved, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from believers who are living in idleness and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not idle when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it; but with toil and labor we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right, but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: Anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living in idleness, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such

persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right. [2 Thessalonians 3. 6-13]

Reader: This is the word of the Lord. All: **Thanks be to God** 

#### **Gospel Reading**

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, he said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down." They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray; for many will come in my name and say, "I am he!' and, "The time is near!' Do not go after them. "When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified; for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes, and in various places famines and plagues; and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven. "But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So make up your minds not to prepare your defence in advance; for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, by relatives and friends; and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls. [Luke 21. 5 - 19]

### Letter from Colin

Sometime in the 1970's some friends of mine were keen supporters of the Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund and one of them had been overseas working as a nurse. They were most keen to spread the support for a new venture, a fair trade arm bringing craft items from the poorer countries to sell in the richer ones. And although you had to very brave to drink their instant coffee the fair trade flourished and was floated off financially separate from TEAR FUND. So at the quiz last night (next Saturday as I write this!) fair trade was on my mind. From the sixteenth century European empires were built on trade. Europeans wanted to get their hands on everything... silver; slaves; sugar; spices. But they didn't just want the goods; they wanted the profits that went with controlling the trade as well. As Sir Walter Raleigh pointed out, "Whosoever commands the trade of the world commands the riches of the world and hence the world itself." But many centuries earlier God had said through the prophet Isaiah, "remove the chains of oppression and the yoke of injustice and let the oppressed go free". For me, this changes the argument about international trade from an economic one to a moral issue. Firstly, should poor countries have to follow trade policies laid down for them by an international community dominated by the rich, or should they be free to choose the policies

they believe in? Secondly, when people's lives depend on the outcome, should weak and strong compete on equal terms? The tea, coffee and sugar that we use in our church can either come through the trade system supported by the rich and strong, or through the Fairtrade system supported by the poor and weak. We have chosen fair-trade. Hooray! Colin Leggate
